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Advocacy

Statewide

AHCI continued support of the Campaign for Better Health Care by mobilizing the community around the Health Care Justice Act, which established a statewide task force to create a plan for providing health coverage to every Illinois resident.

AHCI reconvened our Data Committee to advocate for improved collection and dissemination of AAPI health data in conjunction with state and local public health departments.

Tobacco Control Campaign

Smoking Cessation Program

With generous support from the American Legacy Foundation and in collaboration with Korean American Community Services (KACS), Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH), and the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) School of Public Health, we hired a bilingual and bicultural outreach coordinator, who also is a former smoker. Through his efforts, we produced promotional materials; reached out to Korean churches and businesses; conducted presentations to groups including the Korean Leadership Council and Korean Human Service Providers Council; and offered 2 multi-week cessation classes and individual counseling sessions, reaching 8 individuals.

Chi-Town Coalition of Color Against Cigarettes (C4)

Funding from APPEAL (Asian Pacific Partners for Empowerment and Leadership) has enabled AAPI youth (C4) to mobilize a campaign against tobacco and second-hand smoke in the Argyle community. In partnership with the Chinese Mutual Aid Association (CMAA) and the Multi-Cultural Youth Project, C4 youth have coordinated smoke-free events and established working relationships with local restaurants; this included a community service project that reached 27 restaurants, and in-language interviews with 19 restaurants that assessed their perceptions of the community and evaluated their indoor restaurant smoking policies.newspapers.

Capacity-Building and Technical Assistance

Opening Doors Cultural Competence Training

AHCI held 23 trainings for 463 individuals, including nurses, social workers, nurses, physicians, and administrative staff. The curriculum was developed by a committee that included Jina Lee and Dennis L. Vickers and used didactic presentations, group exercises, case study problemsolving, role playing, and personal storytelling. This program is supported by the Aetna Foundation, Field Foundation, Michael Reese Health Trust, Polk Bros Foundation, and the Square D Foundation.

Expanded Impact

In partnership with the University of Chicago, AHCI received funding from the Arthur Davis Vining Foundation to develop an elective for 4th year medical students on cross-cultural communication. Courses will be offered beginning in Spring 2006.

Since 2003, we have provided our Opening Doors training to St. Elizabeth Hospital's Family Medicine Residency Program. In 2004, in addition to the trainings, we were asked to provide consultation services to formalize their cultural competence curriculum and to develop an evaluation process and tools.

In our efforts to educate health care providers who are serving Chicago's most underserved communities, AHCI partnered with Dr. Ho Tran from the Asian & Pacific Islander American Health Forum to provide cultural competence training to physicians in the Division of General Medicine at John H. Stroger Jr. Hospital of Cook County.

HIV Prevention Capacity-Building

AHCI is the North Central regional partner in the national AAPI HIV Capacity Building Assistance (CBA) program funded by the Centers for Disease Control through the Asian & Pacific Islander American Health Forum and the Asian Pacific Islander Wellness Center (APIWC). Our program focuses on improving organizational development, strengthening HIV prevention interventions, increasing access to HIV services, and assisting HIV community planning groups.

AHCI helped organize two national AAPI trainings at the 2004 U.S. Conference on AIDS and the 2005 HIV Prevention Leadership Summit, reaching 59 individuals. AHCI coordinated two regional trainings on HIV prevention and community planning in February and March 2005, reaching 20 participants. In addition, AHCI provided presentations at local, state, and national conferences and meetings, reaching 95 attendees

AHCI also coordinated the Chicago launch of the APIWC's Banyan Tree Project's (BTP) First National AAPI HIV/AIDS Awareness Day on May 19, 2005, reaching 50 community members.

Additionally, AHCI participated in the National Advisory Council on HIV Health Disparities, whose goal is to draft national HIV standards for culturally and linguistically appropriate services in minority communities. In April 2005, AHCI convened an HIV summit in Elgin with Open Door Clinic, the Office of Minority Health, and Southeast Asian community stakeholders.

Health Access and Prevention

Breast Cancer Awareness

AHCI interviewed several AAPI breast cancer survivors who graciously agreed to share their stories with the community. We plan a future public awareness campaign in partnership with ethnic media.

Language Rights in Health Care

With support from the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), we developed a language access tracking form and trained 29 staff from eight refugee-serving organizations on the topic of language access to health care.

Prostate Cancer Awareness

Funding from IDPH enabled AHCI to partner with Chinese community-based organizations to provide education to 243 individuals. We especially thank the Illinois Health Education Consortium and the Chinese American Service League for their assistance and support.

Lao Community Health Project

AHCI continued its work with the Lao community and providers in the Elgin area, coordinating a health fair in March 2005 that reached 30 individuals.


Health Policy Advocacy


